Heather and Thistle Membership Dues

Clearances

Popularly identified with the eviction of the Highlanders from their traditional lands during the 18th and 19th centuries. This was to make way for agricultural improvement, mainly the grazing of sheep and deer. The term also symbolizes the destruction of what remained of the clans, clan life and Gaeldom in the aftermath of the Jacobite Rebellions of the 'Fifteen and the Forty-Five'.

The term 'clearance' was never used at the time. Similar events associated with enclosure occurred in the Lowlands and elsewhere. In the wider context of capitalist modernization following the Agricultural Revolution there were many parallel experiences in Ireland and on the Continent (Norway) during the 19th century. Like the Highlands most of these regions had experienced rapid population growth, pressure on available cultivable land, and acute poverty – resulting in enforced migration. (from Collins Dictionary of Scottish History)

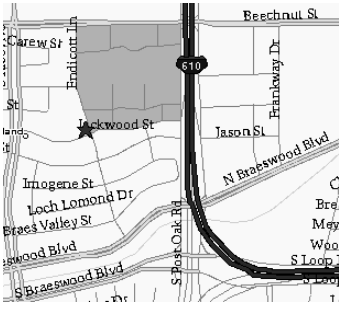

The Heather and Thistle Society puts on the annual Robert Burns Supper and Ball in late January of each year. We are an organization that promotes our Scottish heritage, in various ways.
